<i>Personal Injury Practicum</i>	FL-TORT-407	2	<b>Personal Injury Practicum Course Description – 2 credits, experiential, pass/fail.</b> The course will utilize a personal injury fact pattern(s) to provide students with a practical overview of personal injury litigation beginning with pre-suit investigation through pleading and discovery to case valuation and settlement or trial resolution. Students will participate in a simulated client interview, deposition, client counseling session, mediation presentation, negotiation, motion in limine hearing, jury instruction charge conference, and mock trial. <i>Media Law</i>	FL-SPEC-300I	2	<b>Media Law – 2 credits, graded.</b> Social media present significantly new regulatory and constitutional challenges. This class will focus upon evolution of the media, their societal impact, and the interplay between regulatory and freedom of expression interests. It will examine the historical nature of and regulatory responses to media from revolutionary times to the present. Students will learn with a critical eye how each medium is viewed as unique for First Amendment purposes. Particular attention will be given to regulatory concerns with social media and how, like their antecedents, these instrumentalities likely will disrupt the legal status quo.
